

Teen Bookfest by the Bay 2016



Teen Bookfest by the Bay 2016 was a great success. Just over 500 people attended, some younger than teens

and some older. Six author panel sessions, a writers' workshop, an illustrators' workshop and a manga mixer were options for attendees in addition to vendor and author signing areas. The author panels were arranged by topic ranging from paranormal to realistic fiction, and each panel was made up of 3 or more authors. Twenty authors and one illustrator took part. One author, Guadalupe Garcia McCall was sick and couldn't make it here for the Bookfest.






The authors were treated to a BBQ dinner (from Miller's BBQ) on Friday night before the event at the Keach Family Library in Robstown. Debbie introduced all of the planning team and the moderators, and the authors and illustrator. The authors each received a Texas goodie bag full of items donated by the planning team and

the Corpus Christi Convention and Visitor's Bureau.

Bright and early on Saturday morning, planning team members and volunteers arrived at Tuloso-Midway High School to put up signs and begin the day. The first bus arrived at 8:30 a.m., about an hour before anything began. The event officially opened at 9 a.m. for registration and at 9:30 a.m. book sales, and sessions kicked off.



There were 6 session topics, a writers' workshop and an illustrators' workshop, as well as a student-led manga discussion room for students to choose from for their 5 session options. The writers' and illustrators' workshops were full for all of their sessions. The writers' and illustrators' workshops were full for all of their sessions.



In the writers' workshop, students learned from Lori Goldstein and Jen Brooks what it takes to make a great novel character. Teens looked at characters in existing novels and then came up with some character traits on their own. They used those traits to create an interesting character that they might use in a story of their own.





In the illustrators' workshops, illustrator Evan Turk talked to the students about how to do illustrations. He demonstrated how he created the collages for **Grandfather Gandhi**. Students then chose a story and created an illustration of their own, in whatever form they chose. They were provided with drawing pencils and collage materials. If students didn't choose the workshop track, they could choose from the 6 panels that took place during the day. The panels were: **Trapped** with authors Miracle Austin, C. Lee McKenzie, and Meredith Moore; **Wonders of Imagination** with authors Jen Brooks, Lori Goldstein, and Victoria Scott; **The Power of One** with authors Beth Fehlbaum and Trisha Leaver; **Protectors of the World** with April Henry, Josh McCune, Joe Shine, and Yvonne Ventresca; **The New (Para)Normal** with David Bowles, C. C. Hunter, Marcia Mickelson (a Corpus Christi teacher), and Manuel Ruiz; and **Get Real** with Ashley Alison Formento, Christine Kohler, Rene S. Perez, and Kristin Rae.



After the sessions, students were encouraged to attend the keynote address **A Conversation with Victoria**

Scott. In an easy, relaxed style, Victoria presented information about dealing with rejection, a topic that



authors, and teens, know well. She told the teens, "I chose to use cute cat pictures with this to make it easier to handle." Victoria's appearance was funded by the **ASTEF** grant.



Immediately following the keynote speech, door prizes were awarded. Students received a ticket when they entered for the keynote. Over 100 door prizes were given. Most were books, but there were also a giant Thor stand-up, jewelry, and gift cards. Students were very excited to have their numbers called.

Following the awarding of door prizes, students were invited to return to the commons area where the authors were waiting to sign books, programs, t-shirts, bookmarks, paper, arms, or anything else the teens gave them to sign. Both they and the authors were excited about meeting each other. "This is what it's all about," one of the authors was overheard to say.
